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President's Annual Message



On behalf of the PMI Nova Scotia Chapter Board of Directors, it is my pleasure to present this annual report for 2009 to our Chapter members. 2009 has been a special year for the Chapter.

Social Responsibility

As in the past year, social responsibility was a continued theme for the chapter as we have been very successful at meeting these objectives. Feed Nova Scotia has received donations of food and money totaling just over \$1,100 collected at chapter events this year. Through the Project Management Institute Educational Foundation, we have awarded our first project management scholarship. The scholarship recipient, Andrew McTiernan, is the son of a PMI Nova Scotia member (Wanetta Whitmore). Andrew is studying Chemical Engineering at McGill

University in Montreal.

Events

The 2009 was another full slate year in quality networking, professional development, educational, and social events. For *networking* events, we held 3 dinner meetings, 2 breakfast meetings, and our Volunteer Appreciation night. For *education* events, we held 1 PMF on networking, 3 partnered Professional Development events, 2 workshops around core project management topics with Lean Project Management, and our "Big Event" with Peter de Jager. For *professional development* events, we have held 2 PMP Study Groups. For *social* events, we have held our 2nd Annual Golf Tournament in September and the Holiday Social in December. As with last year, the attendance at our events was our biggest challenge.

We have also tried to work with other professional associations within our area. There was a Joint Professional Development session held with other professional associations such as IIBA, CIPS, CMC, and itSMF. We have also started to have discussions with other professional associations.

We have also collaborated to celebrate "Project Management Week" in the spring with all the Canadian PMI Chapter.

Region 3

Our chapter is included in PMI's Region 3, which includes components from eastern Canada and the north eastern United States. Each year, the leaders (i.e. Board members) from the various chapters within this region, come together to discuss various aspects of component leadership. This was the first year that PMI NS hosted the annual Region 3 Summit, a meeting of component leadership within the Region. The Halifax Region 3 Summit was a huge success, with your leaders showing off their Nova Scotian pride.

Planning

In an effort to continuously improve operations, the Board will evaluate the number and types of events (i.e. professional development, educational and/or networking) being delivered to identify what further changes/improvements need to be made. As in previous years, we depend on your feedback as input into our discussions and decisions on the services and their delivery methods events that best meet your needs.

Conclusion

After my first year as President, I want to thank the board for their efforts in supporting me. I especially want to thank Kevin O'Reilly (our Immediate Past President), who has mentored me throughout the year, and Joan Pike, our Association Manager. Joan's professionalism, energy and commitment to the Chapter and its' success was a key factor in the delivery of quality services to our members.

Next year's vision will include the final transition to the new organization structure, as well as some changes to the types of events; growth of our community outreach presence; and a strengthened focus on the avocation of project management.

The primary focus of the operational division of the PMI NS chapter is the efficient delivery of operational services to the chapter including finance, member communication, technology, and volunteer management. This year also seen the establishment of a Project Management Office (PMO) which was led by Elizabeth McNamara. The primary objective of the PMO is to ensure that various activities and projects completed by the chapter are in alignment PMI Global's strategic vision.

Membership and Volunteers

PMI NS currently has 473 members which represents a slight increase in the total membership over last year.

The chapter currently has 50 dedicated volunteers. Our chapters' volunteers are key to the success of our chapter and work very hard on the chapter's behalf.

Communications

The most significant development within the Communications portfolio for 2009 was the creation of a Technology Committee. The Technology Committee handles the acquisition, implementation, training and support of IT related technologies that PMI Nova Scotia Chapter harnesses for their communications and collaboration needs. The firewall issue that caused a great deal trouble in reaching chapter members via Constant Contact (the marketing service PMI Nova Scotia Chapter leverages for e-mail communications) in 2008 was significantly improved this year; however one member organization remains impacted. E-mail communications are distributed to the impacted organization via alternate means while this issue is investigated.

Three newsletters were published in 2009 (winter/spring/fall) under the guidance of chapter volunteer Julius Kanyamunyu.

Joan Pike (Association Manager) continued to manage the publication of electronic communications, and worked with Event Committees to facilitate and fulfill their communications requirements.

Technology Committee

With an ever increasing number of information technologies being leveraged by PMI Nova Scotia Chapter, a Technology Committee was created to ensure that all IT needs were adequately managed. The Technology Committee is comprised of chapter volunteers Brad George (committee Lead), Randy Delory, and Scott Ellis.

Brad is also the PMI Nova Scotia Chapter representative on the One PMI working group, which works with other One PMI partner chapters to improve functionality of our current chapter web site where appropriate.

With respect to new initiatives in the IT domain, a new project is kicking off this fall to assess the chapter's IT needs, most notably in the areas of our web site and collaboration needs.
